



“Tuesdays Against Execution” Campaign Expands to 55 Prisons

The “Tuesdays Against Execution” campaign reached its 94th week, now involving 55 prisons across Iran, with the male ward of Birjand Prison joining the protest by participating in a hunger strike.

Authorities has intensified executions as a tool to silence dissent. Since early November 2025, 165 individuals have reportedly been executed, including 72 in the last week of October alone. On November 3 and 4, 2025, 29 prisoners were executed over just two days. Official statistics indicate that over 1,313 executions have been carried out in Iran since March 21, 2025, a staggering figure highlighting the normalization of death amid systemic injustice. Despite this climate of fear and repression, prisoners continue to resist and have continued their weekly hunger strike as part of “Tuesdays Against Execution” movement.

Two Jailed British Prisoners in Iran Begin Hunger Strike



In mid-November 2025, Craig and Lindsay Foreman, two British nationals currently imprisoned in Iran, went on a hunger strike in protest against what they describe as a lack of progress in their legal case.

According to family members, Lindsay Foreman told her son, Joe Bennet, that “refusing food is the only power I have.” Bennet added that his mother told him she feels “confused and let down by both the British government and Iranian authorities.”

Craig and Lindsay Foreman were arrested in Kerman in January last year by the IRGC intelligence forces while traveling through Iran on a round-the-world motorcycle journey. Iranian judicial authorities have accused them of espionage, claiming the couple collected information in several provinces under the guise of tourism and research.

Their arrest is part of a continuing pattern in which authorities in Iran detain dual and foreign nationals as political leverage, using them as bargaining chips in diplomatic disputes.

Zahra Shahbaz Tabari’s Death Sentence Is a Mirror Held Up to Iran’s Injustice

Zahra Shahbaz Tabari, a 67-year-old electrical engineer from Rasht-Iran, has been sentenced to death in Iran following a brief, 10-minute video-conference trial held without an independent lawyer.

Tabari, who holds degrees from Isfahan University of Technology and in Sustainable Energy from Sweden, was arrested at her home on April 16, 2025. She was charged with “Baghi” (armed rebellion) accusations her son says are entirely fabricated. The accusations reportedly centre on her possession of a banner reading “Woman, Resistance, Freedom” and an unpublished audio file—evidence authorities claim shows support for an opposition group.

Her case highlights serious concerns overdue process in Iran’s judiciary. Her son who is living in Sweden has been campaigning for her release. Political Prisoner Siamak Amini Denied Medical Care Despite Risk of Paralysis

Evin Prison officials prevented political prisoner Siamak Amini from being taken to hospital on November 11, 2025, despite a severe spinal injury and worsening Behçet’s disease. The denial came after Amini refused to wear a prison uniform for transfer. He has received no treatment for over six months, and human rights advocates warn the neglect amounts to “white torture” and could lead to permanent paralysis.
