

Two Political Prisoners Executed in Semnan Province

Following the recent wave of executions in Iran, two political prisoners, Javad Zamani and Abolfazl Saedi, who were arrested during protests in Semnan province in January 2026. They were convicted on severe charges including "Enmity against God" and "Corruption on Earth." Authorities have not released details regarding their access to legal counsel or the fairness of their trials, further fueling ongoing concerns from human rights organizations about Iran's lack of judicial transparency and its use of the death penalty against political dissidents. Since the start of the conflict between the US government and the regime in Iran, at least 50 political prisoners have been executed.

Mass Hunger Strike in Saveh Prison: 30 Protest Detainees Reject Heavy Sentences

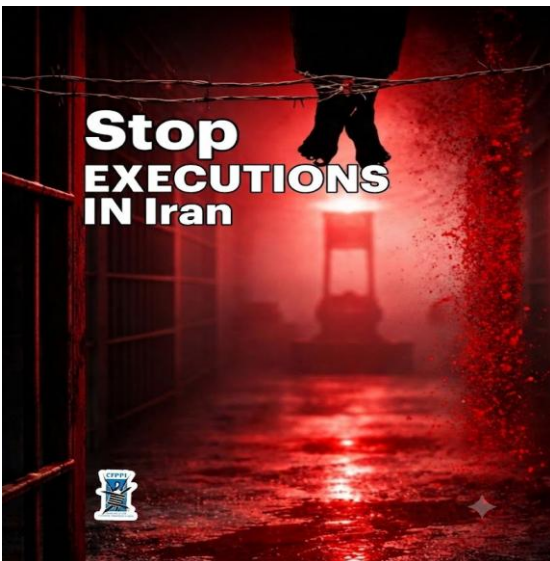
Approximately 30 citizens detained during the January 2026 protests, who are currently incarcerated in Saveh Central Prison, have launched a collective hunger strike. This mass action is a direct protest against the issuance of severe and, in their words, "unjust" sentences.

This protest action unfolds as many detainees from the recent months' protests face lengthy prison terms, judicial restrictions, and ongoing security pressures. A hunger strike remains one of the few avenues available for prisoners to project their voices and grievances beyond the prison walls, though it consistently raises grave concerns regarding the health and physical well-being of the striking individuals.

Urgent Demands:

The Campaign to Free Political Prisoners in Iran has issued an urgent call for immediate attention to the plight of these inmates. CFPPI is demanding the strict upholding of the prisoners' legal rights and an immediate end to the severe, repressive treatment of protesters by the judicial and security apparatus.

"No to Execution Tuesdays" Campaign Continues in its 126th Week Across 57 Prisons



The "No to Execution Tuesdays" campaign has reached its 126th week across 57 Iranian prisons, actively protesting a recent surge in state executions, which have exceeded 177 since March 2026.

The report raises urgent alarms about several political prisoners—including Peyman Ganji, a 23-year-old arrested during recent protests—who are at imminent risk after being transferred to Ghezel Hesar, a prison notorious for carrying out death sentences. Supported by Amnesty International's appeals, this campaign is calling for immediate global solidarity and action from human rights defenders to abolish the death penalty in Iran.

Ongoing Crackdown in Sistan and Baluchestan: Six Citizens Arrested

The regime in Iran has intensified its crackdown on citizens across the country, with daily arrests and increased pressure on individuals continuing to take place.



According to recent reports, security forces have arrested six citizens across the Sistan and Baluchestan province, subsequently transferring them to undisclosed locations. The detained individuals have been identified as Farzad Zarifdel, Eghbal Shahouzehi, Mehdi Dahmardeh, Adel Dehghani, Yasin Mahmoudzehi, and Alireza Dahmardeh. The apprehensions were carried out by security forces in several cities across the region, specifically in Zahedan, Dashtiari, and Sib and Soran.

As of the time of this report, authorities have not provided any information regarding the reasons for these arrests. The current whereabouts, legal status, and physical condition of the six citizens remain entirely unknown.

Death Sentence Issued for 18-Year-Old Misagh Rahmatzadeh



According to recent reports, a death sentence has been issued for Misagh Rahmatzadeh (Kharkouhi), an 18-year-old resident of Zahedan, on various political and security-related charges.

Rahmatzadeh was arrested in November 2025 alongside his brother during a raid by forces from the Zahedan Intelligence Department on their family home. While his brother was released after approximately two months, Misagh remains incarcerated in the political and security ward of Zahedan Central Prison.

Based on available reports, the young man was tried on several heavy charges, including Moharebeh (Enmity against God), cooperation with anti-regime opposition groups, assembly and collusion against

national security, and several other unspecified security charges. In addition to the death penalty, the court has sentenced him to pay a financial penalty of 800 million Tomans.

Informed sources have raised serious alarms regarding his treatment in custody, reporting that Rahmatzadeh was subjected to both physical and psychological torture, as well as severe pressure to extract forced confessions during his interrogation period.

Toronto Hosts International Conference in Support of Political Prisoners



On June 20th 2026, a global conference, organized by the Campaign to Free Political Prisoners in Iran (CFPPI), was held in Toronto, featuring forty speakers who participated both in-person and online. Participating organizations and individuals reaffirmed their commitment to amplifying the voices of political prisoners and their families. They emphasized that demanding the immediate release of political prisoners and an end to executions must remain a top priority. The event was also covered in recent television reports.
